THE BLESSING OF BEING USED BY GOD

God's Work - Our Hands has been a popular theme for congregational direction and activity. The theme is well chosen and challenging beyond imagination. It could go in almost any direction and cover countless programs and functions. Everyone with any degree of intention can become involved. There is no limit to its reach. It paints with an amazingly broad stroke.

Its focus is basically outward reaching into the world as it should. The needs of the world are immense. Human effort to respond to them is strained to the limits. With the intended focus on efforts and results little attention is paid to another dimension of this struggle to make a difference.

There is a byproduct of this movement to assist the world in sustaining itself including the environment along with humanity. That byproduct is the blessing that comes to us as we allow ourselves to be used by God. That blessing is huge. The truth is (you have heard it many times before) we always receive more than we give. Giving away ourselves is the absolute best investment we can ever make throughout life. We gain life by sharing our lives generously. It is the oldest and most accurate mathematics ever used

and taught. It is one of God's miracles.

There is a catch, however. If the focus ever turns from the needs of the world to the gain for ourselves, then the gain is lost forfeited. The focus must remain on the need, the other per- Fred Castor son or persons and the earth Spiritual Guide itself.

Nevertheless, the blessings that come to us from being God's hands (and heart) in the world are the most valuable and long lasting we will ever receive. They do need to be acknowledged and celebrated in deeply felt gratitude.

The value of this mysterious dynamic that God puts into motion is the value of focusing on the needs of other people and the earth. We move ourselves out of focus including our failures, weaknesses, and health issues as well as our positive achievements. We do not spend our time focusing on ourselves, but focus on God's involvement in our lives, using us for divinely directed mission and purpose.

This process might begin as a religious activity on our part, but mysteriously becomes a fantastic spiritual gift from God. As we allow ourselves to be channels for God's mercy and goodness, they rub off on us as they pass through us. An inexplicable transformation of who

we are takes place. We discover to our amazement that we have metamorphosed into new creatures who experience joy at a whole new level.

NEW IN THE LIBRARY

The Air We Breathe: A Novel

By Christa Parrish

Reviewed for Booklist by Carolyn Richard

After losing everything, teenager Molly Fisk has chosen never to leave the museum she lives in with her mom, the only place she feels safe. Years of blaming herself and fearing for her and her mother's safety have left Molly anxious, fearful, and unable to embrace life. Claire Rodriguez, despite her best efforts, has a difficult time moving past the tragedy that changed the landscape of her life. When she meets a young girl, however, she is compelled to reach out, a gesture that begins her healing process. Years later, Claire has lost touch with the girl, and Molly is beginning to feel restless within her small world. Parrish (Watch over Me, 2009) blends Molly's and Claire's stories to create a fast-moving, suspenseful, enrapturing novel about what it means to lose everything and how crucial it is to let others in and learn to depend on God. Fans of Christian fiction with kick and psychological depth will be engaged and touched by Parrish's exciting third novel.

The Sandman: The Story of Sanderson Mansnoozie

by William Joyce Reviewed for *Booklist* by Karen Cruze Preschool-Gr. 2

Joyce's work has always had an oddball charm, even in its most commercial Rolie Polie Olie moments. Both his texts and illustrations are whimsical, with allusions to classic late-nineteenth and early-twentieth -century children's lit paired with swirly nouveau and stylized deco forms. This second in the Guardians of Childhood series opens with the hero of The Man in the Moon (2011) looking for a helper in his endeavor to keep children safe at night. Enter Sandy, aka the Sandman, aka Sanderson Mansnoozie. This rotund ball of baby fat pilots a star until it falls prey to Pitch, King of Nightmares, whose minions Sandy later vanquishes. While the story doesn't quite have the coherent sweetness of Dinosaur Bob and His Adventures with the Family Lazardo (1995) or The Leaf Men and the Brave Good Bugs (1996), it makes a pleasant nighttime read, and the illustrations of tattooed mermaids, heroic constellations, and the golden Sandy himself are worth poring over time and again. Grown-ups and children alike will savor this book's rich, old-fashioned charms.

The second picture book in Academy Award winner William Joyce's The Guardians of Childhood series tells how the Sandman dreamed up his sweet-dreams legacy.

Hunger in Larimer County often goes unnoticed. We live in a great community, so it's easy to overlook tions to the Food Bank: hunger when it doesn't touch you or someone you love. That's because hunger hides behind closed doors. It lives in the home of single mother who skips dinner to make sure her children have enough to eat. It lives in the apartment of the grandfather who has to choose between a meal and taking his medicine. It lives in the bedroom of a young child who has to make it all night without food until the next school day when she knows she will be fed.

WELCOMING ALL THROUGH SERVING-FFH

OSLC FAITH FAMILY HOSPITALITY NEWS

Happy summer all. This write up may seem somewhat serious but it is not meant to be. My hope is that we as a caring church community try to embrace and in a way own what the homeless families are going through. Hopefully this information will help us to be empathetic and more understanding of the families in our care.

What is Family Homelessness in America?

Current 2015 information from the American Institutes for Research for the National Center on Family Homelessness defines family homelessness in the United States and I quote from the article:

"Every year, hundreds of thousands of American families become homeless, including more than 1.6 million children. This represents 1 in every 30 children in the U.S. These families are hidden from our view. They move frequently, and many are doubled-up in overcrowded apartments with relatives or friends. Others sleep in cars and campgrounds or send their children to stay with relatives to avoid shelter life. Once in shelter, despite the efforts of dedicated staff, life can be noisy, chaotic, and lack privacy. Homelessness increases the likelihood that families will separate or dissolve.

Family homelessness is caused by the combined effects of lack of affordable housing, unemployment, limited access to resources and supports, health and mental health challenges, the challenges of raising children as a single parent, and experiences of violence. As the gap between housing costs and income continues to widen, more and more families are at risk of homelessness. Even a seemingly minor event can trigger a catastrophic outcome and catapult a family onto the streets.

Families experiencing homelessness are under considerable stress. Homelessness is a devastating experience that significantly impacts the health and well-being of adults and children. Often, members of homeless families have experienced trauma. These experiences affect how children and adults think, feel, behave, relate, and cope."

What does Family Homelessness look like in Northern Colorado?

The defining factors for homeless families in our neighborhood look much the same as the national picture. Families are the fastest growing homeless group in our county. Over 1,200 children in our local schools are homeless. Fifty per cent of adults staying in shelters are working but unable to afford the daily costs of supporting themselves or a family. Ninetytwo per cent of homeless women, many with children, are domestic violence survivors.

The Homeless 2020 Project in Fort Collins did a survey of the homeless population earlier this year. "On a single night in January 2015, community volunteers conducted a Point-in-Time

Count, which surveyed everyone who was staying in shelters or staying in unsheltered areas (e.g., cars, outside, or in structures unfit for human habitation). A total of 301 individuals were counted on that night."

- Over 20% of those individuals counted were under the age of 18
- 32 homeless veterans were surveyed, an increase from the previous two years
- 68 individuals qualified as chronically homeless, meaning they had been homeless for a year or more or had four or more cycles of homelessness in the past three years

What can be done to help prevent Family and Child Homelessness in our community?
