No, indeed Grace is given by God that you may be more active in the world for Christ's sake. Unfortunately, the Church in general is currently struggling in today's world to continue making that significant difference it once succeeded in doing. It no longer occupies the major spot in the lives of a growing number of people.

The reasons for this dramatic change are numerous, familiar and far too valid to be dismissed. Because of the dramatic change in people's lives as well as their perception of the Church, it needs to take a serious look at itself and identify the underlying causes of this obvious shift.

We live in a different world today that is more characterized by rapid change than maintaining stability. Survival in today's world requires learning to live on the fly, a totally different lifestyle from past generations when stability was so highly valued.

The critical questions that exists for the Church in this new landscape are: What is its legitimate place in today's world? What is its unique role? The question is not: What should we be doing to keep the Church alive? Rather, the question is: What should the Church be doing to fulfill its true calling? When these questions are adequately answered and act-

ed upon, other things will sequentially fall into place.

The Church was created to be a *community of spiritual discernment.* All other functions and activities in which it rightfully engages should flow from that basic orientation and be closely monitored for their faithfulness to that fundamental charge.

Responsible Church life centers around sacred worship, the very first item mentioned in our congregational mission statement. Worship is to be central in congregational life. Therefore, every effort should be made to craft worship that enhances and deepens our relationship with the Holy One. Music, liturgy, preaching, the Sacrament should all be designed and carried out in such a way that God is glorified and our spiritual needs are met. Our deportment when we assemble to worship should be in keeping with our awareness of the gravity of the occasion. *We are in the presence of Almighty God.* Any factor that detracts from this sacred time has no place in worship and should find a spot elsewhere in the life of the community.

ONE VILLAGE ONE FAMILY SEEKING MORE "VILLAGE" MEMBERS

When we consider the plight of the homeless families among us, we sometimes feel that there is nothing we, as individuals, can do. But with One Village One Family we can make a difference. As David Rout, Executive Director of Homeless Gear, pointed out in a forum on September 13, there are not enough villages for the number of families who need them. Can Our Saviour's form one or two villages this fall and winter?

This program was launched among churches in Denver in 2006. When Homeless Gear began spearheading the effort in Ft. Collins in 2014, it was opened to include groups other than churches. Statewide OVOF has helped 1,000+ families secure stable housing, with 87% still housed after the first year. How does the program work? OVOF recruits and trains groups of 4-6 compassionate people who support one family as they work to find affordable housing and get their lives back on track. The typical village/family relationship lasts 6-7 months, with village members attending a training session, holding an organizational meeting, and then providing ongoing, structured mentoring--meeting monthly with the family to discuss such topics as budgeting, nutrition, and literacy. The village members raise funds to help with a security deposit and first month's rent (\$1500). They also choose a lead person who contacts the family weekly. Susan Crowe, a new HG staff member, spends half time supporting villages as they do their work.

How do families enter the program? They are pre-screened and referred by eight partner groups, such as Neighbor to Neighbor and our own Faith Family Hospitality.

FUN FOR ALL GENERATIONS-THE CROP HUNGER WALK(5K)

Sunday October 4th

is a fund raising event for Church World Service. It is a group of 34 Protestant and Orthodox denominations that band together to employ their resources more efficiently. Over 85% of the donations reach a CWS program/project.

The local money raised is split 25% to the Food Bank for Larimer County and 75% to world wide programs via CWS. See below for the two types of projects.

Hand Outs: --- CWS provides food and shelter in areas that

suffer from civil unrest, natural disasters and other emergency situations.

<u>Hand ups:</u>----CWS sponsors projects that will alleviate hunger for the long term, such as crop seeds, irrigation equipment, water wells and projects, education (women especially), kits, and technologically appropriate equipment.

Since 1988 the Fort Collins CROP Hunger Walk has contributed over \$265,000 to CWS and over \$65,000 to the local Food Bank.

There is no cost to walk, however walkers are expected to generate sponsors for their walk. This can be done on line at <u>www.crophungerwalk.org/</u> <u>fortcollinsco</u>

The 2015 walk is on Oct. 4 at 1 PM starting at the First Presbyterian Church.


