

A note from our Pastors

y friend Pastor Brigette Weier shared that her guilty pleasure is listening to Christmas tunes all throughout Advent.

Pastor Leta Behrens admits that she starts listening right after Halloween, and I gotta admit, I love to sing those Christmas tunes for as long as I can too.

The rest of the public laughs at our neurotic guilt over worrying about starting early, but our reasoning is based on a very real problem. You see we realize that the extension of the Christmas season can be a wonderful treat, but our neurosis comes from this being at the direct expense of the season of Advent.

The proliferation of Christmas tunes is not really the issue. It's a world that loves the culture of Christmas, but not the spiritual aspects of it. It may be a case of us getting what we want, and not what we need. After all, most of us will admit that we live in an "instant" society that never waits for anything. We are used to immediate results and instant gratification, and often when we need something we purchase it immediately. The only problem is that when it comes to the Spirit and how we experience God, Advent is more aligned with the reality of our experience in the world than Christmas. The Spirit doesn't flow through a billboard. It isn't lit-up in our trees. It often comes like the cold and broken Alleluia that the song writer Leonard Cohen writes about. It mostly comes when we least expect it.

Your leaders will admit they are hypocrites for not giving up Christmas tunes, but we do want to invite you into the season of Advent to experience all the riches this season has to offer. A period of waiting, of expectant hoping, of attentive listening and wondering is our wish for you.

The story of God's people has never been one of immediate rewards. It has been a story of a God who loves all of Creation and is here to redeem suffering, to walk with us in the valleys of life, and to empower us to reflect God's light and love to the rest of the world that is caught up in life's struggles.

On the day after Christmas the Christmas songs on the radio will end. At midnight December 26th the world begins to sing a different tune. What if this year you sought to celebrate the 12 Days of Christmas that come after? What if this year you made an effort to experience Advent as well as Christmas?

iscernment is the key to our acceptance of God's presence in our lives. It is a unique gift of the Spirit whose shadow is ever upon us.

One dimension of discernment is the discovery that God speaks to us endlessly, and in countless ways. Alas, we also hear evil messages within the din of the world's persistent noise. Discernment is the Spirit's operative tool for our identifying the source of the messages that come our way.

There is another dimension of discernment that is oblique to the above mentioned understanding. It is also a message from God, but specifically an answer to prayers requesting direction in decision-making, in which we are constantly engaged. "What should I do, Oh God? Where do I go from here? Which of these options would be better for me, my family, the church and/or the world? What would you have me do?"

Decision-making is not an easy assignment! Yet, our lives are filled with this demand. We are confronted by decisions daily—hourly. Decisions fill our minds, occupying its every nook and corner. We lose sleep wrestling with them. They create massive stress.

There is help—incredible help—available. It comes from the most reliable source—the Divine.

Recently I visited a church in another state that has capitalized on this spiritual resource in behalf of its members. In addition to listing in the bulletin the names of the people who need congregational prayers for healing and comfort, there was another separate category listing the names of people requesting the congregation to pray for them as they face difficult decisions. The heading of that list of names was *Discernment*. People ask for prayers of the people in their behalf as they are confronted by life's difficult choices.

This is a super idea and one we could incorporate into OSLC worship. It is not necessary to mention the dilemma, only the names of the persons for whom to pray.

It should go without saying that we ought personally to be practicing this highly beneficial and mysterious process in our own lives as we are confronted by difficult decisions. Divine help and direction can be forthcoming when we ask God to be involved in this important process that is a constant in our lives.

It is amazing how this works—but it does. Truly a mystery! Ask God to be intimately involved in your own decision-making as well as with others for whom you share concern.


The Joy of Giving is the Essence of Living
