Hands in Praise- Sign Language in Worship

Words have a limit. Words don't satisfy what is being expressed. Experience the joy of using sign language to sing praises. Absolutely no sign language experience is necessary to answer the "call" to sign or discover the "passion" of sharing this unique language of the deaf with all audiences (hearing or non-hearing). In American Sign Language the meaning and emotion in a song is absolutely eloquent and artistically expressed - adding a new dimension to praise. The whole body becomes the "musical instrument" of the song - the words, the feeling and the spiritual meaning. This is a workshop where "hands on" can't be anything but "hands on." Attendees of the workshop will learn to sign the chorus of "How Great Thou Art" and will sign the chorus at the at the worship service at the end of the gathering.

"Hands in Praise" is an American Sign Language Christian Choir. Members of the choir represent 11 different churches in Northern Colorado. There are 24 members of the choir in Colorado, 8 performing members, 13 support members in Colorado and 3 out-of-state members in Wyoming, Tennessee and South Carolina. The choir is united in their belief there is only one God who exists eternally in three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The outreach ministry of Hands in Praise is to worship God in song by signing in American Sign Language (ASL), the official language of the deaf. We believe signing draws us into a deeper level of

Loving Your Neighbor As Yourself: Why It's Important to Relieve Hunger will focus on Matthew 22:36-40, specifically the idea of loving your neighbor as yourself. Through interactive learning, we will learn about what ELCA World Hunger does and some facts about hunger in general. Participants will be able to take time to think deeper about the root issues of hunger and how hunger affects their communities. Activities within this workshop include Kahoot, watching a video on ELCA World Hunger (with a debrief), and looking at hunger through our faith as Lutherans. Loving your neighbor as yourself includes reaching out to those who may be struggling and offering help.

We are an ecumenical and multicultural youth group, who are 99% youth of color. We will be joined in this workshop by youth from HKBP Montclair Lutheran Church who are an Indonesian-Specific congregation. These things are important for us to note in a denomination that is mostly white and can make it challenging for our youth to feel welcomed.

Starting the Conversation

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among 10-19 year olds in Colorado. While that statistic may be surprising and alarming which is more shocking is that nobody seems to be speaking to those that are affected most, teenagers. At this session you will learn some of the signs of depression, anxiety, and suicide and will spend time talking in small groups about what YOU can do about it. The solution to this public health epidemic lies with you, Colorado's teenagers. Let's Start the Conversation.

Robbie's Hope was established by Kari and Jason Eckert to provide support to our local resources in an effort to broaden and deepen the awareness of depression and suicide prevention in our local schools. Robbie was 15 years old and a Sophomore at Lakewood High School. He was a great student excelling in all his classes, especially math. Robbie was at home in the pool or on the courts playing the two sports he loved deeply, swimming and tennis. Surrounded by his friends at meets and at matches he was full of joy. Robbie brought so much joy and happiness to those around him. The past two summers he taught young golfers through First Tee of Denver and young swimmers at Rolling Hills Country Club. Seeing his students success always brought a smile to his face and when they failed his compassion shown through and gave them hope. Despite his gift of bringing love and joy to others Robbie was suffering in the darkness, battling privately with incredible pain. He succumbed to the silent illness of depression and took his own life on Thursday, October 11, 2018. Robbie will always be remembered for his grace, kindness to others, wit and joyful presence. He was always looking out for others and putting them before himself.
