We invite you into the spaces and the opportunities this fall and we invite you to open up space for vision and engagement in how you hear grace and let it flow through you.

As you walk through your fall days, trust in this voice to come towards you and through you. Trust in the moments that you can hear it and in the moments that you cannot. Trust in the promise that God's Holy Spirit is alive and well and is a part of you.



MUSIC HEALS...

A STORY FROM KISS

Jackie is one classy lady. She arrives ten minutes early for the KISS music program dressed in a beautiful silk patterned blouse, makeup perfect, hair washed and styled, beautiful jewelry, and ready to sing. You can see the joy in her eyes. She still has a lot of life to live. You see, Jackie has used her musical gifts all her life dating back to when she was 17 years old and serving as a nurse's assistant in a World War II hospital in California. One day, after a program, Jackie took me aside. She wanted to share a story with me. "I experienced World War II," she said. "I did not go overseas but served right here in the United States. I grew up near Santa Barbara. I was 17 when I volunteered at a hospital for soldiers wounded in the war. They were coming back from frightening, horrific experiences that left them disabled; physically, mentally, and spiritually. At times there was no consoling them. They were broken, life would never be the same for them because of their memories and physically wounded bodies. I was a nursing assistant. I tried to take care of their physical needs but I knew that wasn't enough to start the healing process from war. I always enjoyed singing. It lifted me up when I was down. I would sing for my family, friends, and whoever would listen. I wanted to share my love of music. I knew these wounded soldiers were suffering in more ways than I could imagine. What could I do? Suddenly, I remembered how music always helped me see life in a different way. It lifted me up. Maybe I could use my voice to help others. So I sang. The reason I am telling you this is because I sang the songs we sang today during the program. Those songs brought back so many good memories. I went up and down the rows of beds in the hospital singing songs that gave the soldiers encouragement. I sang hymns, I sang patriotic songs, I sang Broadway numbers, I wanted to lift their spirits. Once I started singing, the patients would start singing with me. We lifted each other up through the power of music. Today, you reminded me of those times and how music is so therapeutic, powerful, and universal. Keep doing what you are doing. I feel I made a difference all my life through music and now you are making a difference, too. I'll see you next month." With that, Jackie turned to go, but not before I gave her a hug and told her how much I appreciated her story and her words of encouragement. Our seniors have so many stories to tell and so many things to teach us and share with us through all they have lived. We need to appreciate their wisdom, their courage, and their strength. We need to learn from their experiences and respect what they have to offer us with their life stories and their advice. They are gems that have been polished by living on this earth for so long. They are a blessing and a treasure to all of us.



Voting members of Churchwide Assembly voted to endorse and support the Thursdays in Black Campaign of the World Council of Churches.
