A Note from Pastor Michael

Blessings and peace to you this day. I wanted to share with you a little bit more about my sabbatical. I was supposed to depart for 13 weeks this summer, and my goal was to disconnect from work, and reconnect with friends and family that were not at church. The church has provided this resource for our Pastors, and I was looking forward to it tremendously. As you may have imagined, the pandemic caused my plans to change considerably, and so I took an abbreviated, two-part sabbatical, that hopefully will be completed next summer. This summer, I planned the safest event I could, which was going to my parents place in Door County, Wisconsin.

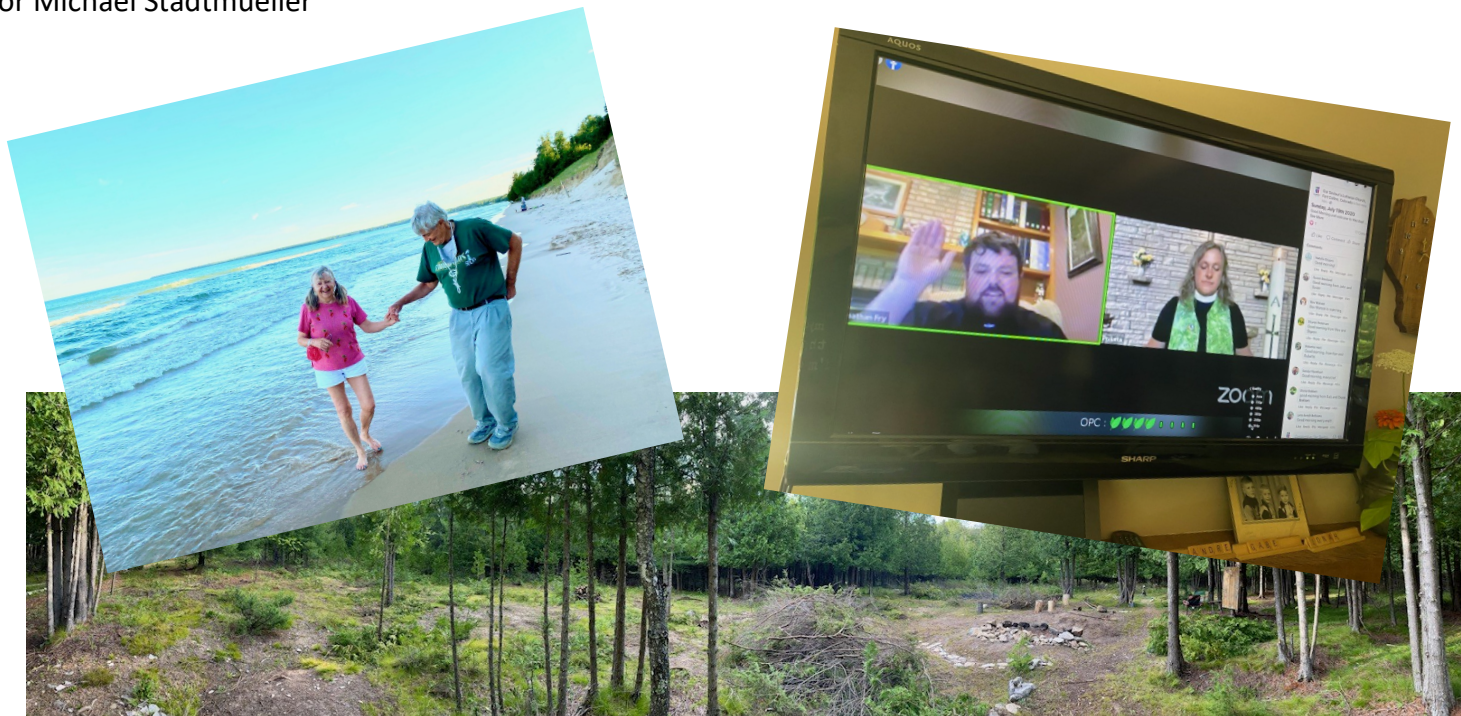
I wrote some details about this time in the daily devotions on August 17-19th, that you may have read, but I wanted to share a little bit more here. For the first three weeks of sabbatical I had my boys with me. The first week, as we drove out, we took a little bit longer to drive through Wyoming and South Dakota and stopped at some spots along the way for hikes and sightseeing. We saw the ruts on the Oregon Trail, and walked through the beautiful wilderness areas of the Needles and the Badlands in South Dakota. It felt "normal" in this time of pandemic, and we even listened to a book together on the way out.

Following this time, we joined my parents who invited us into their quarantine team. The days were filled with hikes and swims and evening games. It was restful and life-giving, and we worshiped online with you on Sundays. After my boys left, I spent the rest of the time with my parents. My day consisted of working on the back 40 acres of my parents' property. I would start the mornings alone, and cut branches for several hours, before returning for breakfast. We sat together and talked about things that so many children and parents never get to talk about in such an uninterrupted manner. After supper, we returned to the acreage together, and they would help me with the burn pile I had created.

I especially loved working with my dad, who has created a path on his property that goes back a half mile. The simple nature of my day I found therapeutic, and the isolation was challenging and exciting for an extrovert such as myself. I cleared about an acre of land that was covered in junipers that completely take over the area, and found the physical work refreshing. I return to you refreshed and hopeful for the time to come.

As we enter the fall, I am aware that the pandemic is not over, and that the challenges that we face in isolation and disruption will continue. As we prepare to enter the winter months, I want to say thank you for providing this time. I have received a gift in spending time with my parents and my spirit is reset for the work ahead.

An update from the OSLC Visioning Team

Peace and blessings to all. The Visioning Team has been busy this summer! Thanks to Zoom, virtual meetings have helped the team stay connected and enabled us to press forward with a number of projects and initiatives during this time of social distancing.

The team members include Fred Castor, Brian Dunbar, Madelyn Mihm, Kris Eisele, Rosie Goetz (chair), Natalie Grapes, Sara Halac, Tina Stegall, Shannon Wagner, and Rob Petterson. Pastors Leta and Michael are the team consultants. Jim LaDoux of Vibrant Faith, joined the team in January, 2020. As a coach, Jim has provided the team with expertise, guidance and materials to help chart new pathways forward.

The Visioning outcomes the team hopes to accomplish are:

- Clarify who we are as a congregation and where God is leading our faith community.
- Listen deeply to our congregation and local community, discerning how we can best serve others.
- Create a written plan that describes our congregation’s priorities and how we will move into our preferred future.
- Create systems and norms that sustain our congregation’s mission, vision, values and culture.

Initially, the Visioning Team’s goal was to assess and measure the overall health and vitality of our church in 3 areas based on the ELCA Congregational Vitality Project: the congregation’s connection with God, each other and the world. In the fall of 2019, a Congregational Vitality Survey was completed. The overall vitality score was 4.1. This score is a good reflection that our church is maintaining and moving forward. This survey helped the team focus on areas that could be built upon.

Our coach, Jim LaDoux, has provided the team with tools to help establish a more comprehensive picture of the church and surrounding community. These studies have been completed and are as follows:

- 1.) The Delta Communication Assessment was used to evaluate the communication platforms currently used by the church;
- 2.) The Faith X Demographic Study (Neighborhood Missional Intelligence Report) was completed in April, 2020 using data from 2019. This comprehensive report includes population characteristics from the area surrounding our church; and
- 3.) Community Leader Interviews were obtained to provide insights into the needs of the community and suggested ways our church can better serve the community at large.

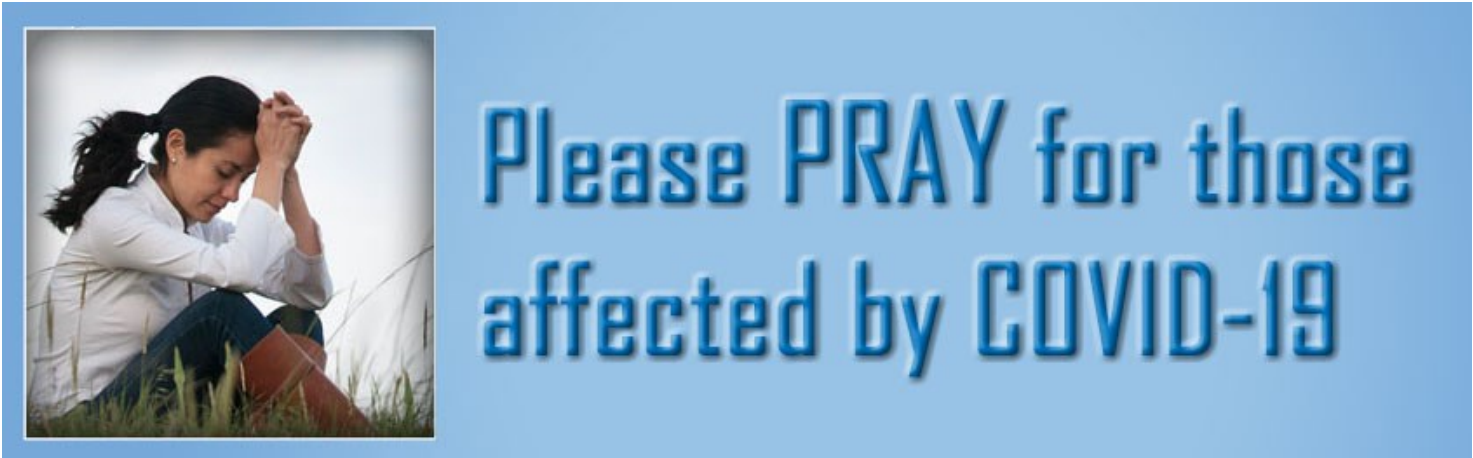
In June, two project sub teams were launched. The areas of focus were chosen based on the data obtained from the Vitality Survey and assessment tools previously mentioned. The sub teams are meeting multiple times during the month and are currently working on initiatives in each of the following areas:

Welcoming and Engagement Sub Team. This team is currently working on initiatives to help welcome and support new members and also explore ways to increase engagement in the wider community.

Spiritual Awakening, Growth and Development Sub Team. This team is focusing on initiatives to enhance individual and group spiritual development across the lifespan.

In the months ahead, the Visioning Committee will keep the congregation informed about its progress. Team members will be contacting and engaging in conversation with church leaders, established committees and the congregation at large for insights and input on initiatives.

God is good and faithful, and we are grateful to you as a congregation in all the ways you have been together as church during this time.

This fall, we will be embracing another theme together: *Becoming Church*. We will continue to seek the wisdom of the Holy Spirit, as well as enter into the work and grace of what it means to be church right now in this pandemic and how we can keep becoming; each hour, each day, each week, each year. As we continue to grow together, we will continue to be the church in our place and in our time.

In the face of the COVID19 pandemic, we have had to make many difficult, and even heartbreaking decisions as a congregation. The COVID Team and OSLC Church Council will continue to meet and lead us in future decisions. **OSLC will continue to follow recommendations from our Synod, as well as public health and government requirements.** The Property Team is working diligently to ensure the air filters, HVAC systems and cleaning protocols are all up to date. The OSLC Council voted to allow the preschool to use their regular space and begin their school year taking all the precautions and implementing safety procedures including cleaning, small class sizes, and mask protocols. The OSLC preschool staff and board have approved a plan that is clear and direct, and has taken every precautionary step necessary. We ask you to hold the teachers and children in your prayers. We have been living in pandemic mode since the middle of March. By now we imagined that conditions would be improving or that our concerns would be more focused on a possible second wave of coronavirus in the fall. At the time of this writing, infection rates and the related death toll from COVID-19 continue to rise both in our country and region. There is no clear end in sight to when and how this pandemic will ease its grip on our life. The idea of 14 days of successive decreases of cases in any location, including in much of our synod, seems a long way off. Situations elsewhere in the world show that even when cases subside for a time, new outbreaks can occur when preventative measures are relaxed. It is clear that we cannot control what the virus will do. Wishing it away will not change our reality. We are learning the hard way that our only option for helping mitigate the spread of this virus is to adapt our behavior. Given that the end of this pandemic is not in sight, we must continue to adapt our life not only as individuals, but as the church. While this is not what any of us desires, it IS possible for us to make the necessary adaptations in our individual lives as well as in our practices and ministry as the church. Like generations before us that have faced significant challenges, determination and resiliency are required. The members of the Synod Council and I want to recognize and affirm the hard work of our rostered ministers, church professionals, congregations, and ministries during this time. You have risen to the occasion, adapted your practices and routines, and worked diligently to safeguard the health and well-being of our neighbors while still living out our calling as Christ's Church. We are grateful for every one of you and for the amazing efforts you have made. Given all those realities, how do we move forward as a church becoming in navigating this next chapter of our pandemic landscape? That is what these updated recommendations are intended to address. It's important to understand that a key value behind these recommendations, like those offered in May, is NOT returning as quickly as possible to what we knew before. Rather the value at work here asks how we might use this pandemic to learn what it means to be a church becoming. What does it mean to navigate this next chapter in this pandemic landscape, not merely trying to survive, but living and acting as a church that is open to becoming all the Spirit needs us to be for the life of the world?

RECOMMENDATION ONE: It is recommended that congregations and communities of faith continue to prioritize worship opportunities that are safe, accessible, invitational, meaningful, and sustainable. The use of an online/digital platform remains the highest recommended format for corporate worship through at least the end of the calendar year. Any in-person worship experience should prioritize an outdoor venue, small groups, physical distancing, and the use of face coverings. There is a strong likelihood that corporate in-person worship that is able to include all parishioners inside of a church building will not be advisable well into 2021.

RECOMMENDATION TWO: It is recommended that congregations and communities of faith continue to offer low-risk, in-person gatherings tailored to the needs and vulnerabilities of the various people within your setting for the sake of the emotional, physical, communal, and missional health and well-being of the congregation/ministry.

RECOMMENDATION THREE: It is recommended that congregations and communities of faith use this time to pay particular attention as people of faith to those in your community, in our nation, and in this world who are most vulnerable during the pandemic and let that inform your ministry efforts. Priority should be given to anti-racism work that addresses individual and corporate contributions to systemic racism and a culture of white supremacy/privilege for the sake of understanding and dismantling such injustice and fostering authentic diversity in our church and nation.

RECOMMENDATION FOUR: It is recommended that every congregation/ministry of our synod take advantage of this disorienting time of pandemic to intentionally ask "church becoming" questions. What does it look like to more fully become the church the Spirit needs us to be for the life of God's beloved world? What conversations, partners, and resources will help you explore the future we are being called to embrace as the Body of Christ in our time and place?

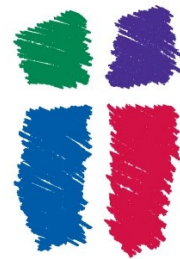
