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PASTOR LETA ARNOT BEHRENS

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road. Matthew 2:9-12

We just finished our Epiphany celebration and selected our star words. As a reminder, star words are the words we drew from baskets of 100s of stars to come to God in prayer and gratitude and to hear from God a new word for a new year. The star word that I drew was "tend." Tend is a good word! It can be about tending to myself or tending to others. It reminds me of gardening and plants and how the pruning I did this fall and will do this spring will lead to new growth. How the branches and leaves that fall to the ground will become the dirt and grow back up again. It reminds of how the tending to God's creation can open me up to the tending of so many other things in this world.

This past year we have done a lot of tending and even some pruning! We have been able to adapt to new ways of doing things together, such as knowing that we are one community online and in person. We have tended to the children through mentoring and Kids' Club and music and play. We have cut back on the things that are less important and turned our attention to the new ways of living a spiritual life that God is calling us to.

As the wise ones followed that star by faith, they were tending to a calling that was within them and from outside of them. They were tending to the way in which they had been invited into the cosmic and close story of Jesus, God with us. And they were using what they knew—their past experiences, the directions from Herod, the political climate of the world—to allow them to be led forward by a new mystery that turned them home another way. The story of the wise ones can help us remember to look at the past year with wonder that our congregation has participated in vast global issues and very close local ones. We have tended to one another in prayers and tended to the world in our actions. This story can also help us to be present. To see the stars that are above us right now and to gaze into the sky that invites us into the future. And we can look to the stars, our star words, and most importantly the good news of God's love, to direct us in our purposes and our new purposes for this year.

As I gaze at stars tonight, I am grateful for the past year with this community. I am grateful that we could tend to a family from Afghanistan and tend to our own beloved. I am grateful that children come to play and learn here and that grandmas and grandpas do the same with everyone in between. Our building, our space, our gifts to those in need, and our care for each other through education, worship, prayer, and service is a big bright light in the sky. God sees and hears our prayers and says, this is good.

May you continue to walk with us through the nights and the days, gazing at stars and letting them speak words of wisdom from the past and hope for the future. May we do this together. May you know God is here.

PASTOR MICHAEL STADTMUELLER

"For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven." Ecclesiastes 3:1

Thank you for being on this journey with us. Your connection with our shared ministry is vital to its future. No, we don't know what tomorrow looks like but we do know God will be there. We hope you can find ways to journey closely with us. We are thankful for your financial support that has remained strong throughout the past years. We invite you to find ways to utilize your gifts of time and talent within our community or in one of the many organizations that we support and connect with.

This past year could be categorized as a return to normal. As we gazed upon the crowd at Christmas, we, as pastors realized it was the closest thing we had experienced to a "before COVID-19" reality of church. This categorization is probably not a healthy one for us to dwell on however. Some things will return to a familiarity where we can look back and see a parallel to another time and place, but other things will never return to that "used to be" category. It is most helpful for us to be mindful of this truth. The church around the world was going through a great change before COVID-19 and still is. We are all trying to figure out how to be the church of this next age.

As we look at our church worship, attendance remains lower in person than before COVID-19, but we have a considerable group watching online and also have discovered that many newcomers check us out there before coming in person. Our music groups and bible studies are now at or above pre-COVID-19 levels. Our new member classes have remained at a similar size to pre-COVID-19 levels. We have worked on developing easier ways to give electronically directly through the touch of your phone.

The good news is that God is still God and whatever is next for the church, we can be confident that God and Christ's love will lead us. The other good news is that, in the grand scheme of things, we as a congregation are well equipped for the road ahead. No, we don't have it all figured out, but we are flexible and healthy with a strong number of connected people, a clear identity of mission and a flexible building with only minimal debt.

We anticipate a year ahead that will need to be more responsive to the needs of refugees beyond our own Hamadzai family that we continue to support. We continue to seek to work with Northern Colorado leaders to further flesh out this network and to raise awareness to an ongoing crisis/opportunity with so many people in need of relocation.

Many have asked about my personal health. My experience with COVID-19 and Lyme Disease was quite a 1-2 punch that kept me down most of August and September, but my body has recovered well from those events. I feel like I am now at 100 percent, but it reminded me once again how precious and fragile life is. Thank you for your prayers and concern.

We look forward to sharing the coming year with you. We don't know what tomorrow will bring our way, but we are thankful we are on this journey with you.

I look forward to the coming months and our continued work together for the sake of the Gospel.

I want to leave you with an excerpt from "Blessing in the Chaos" by Jan Richardson

"To all that is chaotic in you, let there come silence. Let there be a calming of the clamoring, a stilling of the voices that have laid their claim on you, that have made their home in you, that go with you even to the holy places but will not let you rest, will not let you hear your life with wholeness or feel the grace that fashioned you...Let there be an opening into the quiet that lies beneath the chaos, where you find the peace you did not think possible and see what shimmers within the storm."

In the chaos of the world may you remember that God is right here, and God is present in all the busyness and messiness of life. May you remember that God names you beloved, and surrounds you with love.

Dear OSLC members,

It has been a wonderful year as we have watched our world, both within the church and outside, open back up and re-connect. Our congregation has returned to pre-COVID ways of being with each other and serving the community, as well as found new ways. I cannot possibly list all the ways we have done so, but I will give a few examples that stick out to me. Kids' Club has been a huge success in engaging families of children, especially thanks to Pastor Leta and the youth. Intern Pastor Jon led the youth on an enviable trip to the Apostle Islands where they somehow learned how to row a 10 person canoe. Despite battling various health challenges, Pastor Michael led Theology Pub and helped us welcome new members.

Various ministries have continued their hard work to serve the community. For example, Rally for Justice was held once again by our Faith and Justice team, with great success. We came together as a congregation to support the Hamidzai family, serving as a model to other church communities who also want to support refugee families.

After two years of uncertainty and frequent isolation, I have personally appreciated being able to attend in person services regularly. There is something about the magic of singing together, listening and learning together, and seeing each other. Even as we are largely "back to normal" for in person services, we can still reach those who are staying home or traveling with our live streamed services and other online connection points.

Council has been impressed by the incredible generosity of the congregation this year. OSLC increased our budget in 2022, creating a challenge for our congregation to give more. We are proud to say that our members rose to this challenge spectacularly. Not only that, but over \$100,000 was given beyond our planned budget to various organizations within and outside the church, including: Pine Ridge Reservation, ELCA World Hunger, Lutheran Campus Ministry, Afghan Family Support, Homeward Alliance, ISAAC, Lutheran World Relief, and International Health Partners.

Less tangible are the countless hours our members spend volunteering their time to serve each other and our world, including: providing and serving meals for Lenten suppers, bringing donuts and making coffee, serving as usher or worship assistant, and working on committees.

Council also greatly appreciates the administrative staff who work hard to manage all of the various behind-the-scene functions that keep our church running: Karyn Eddins, Mandy Fogo, Ann Story, Glenna Colton, and our newest hire, Gus Brockmann. We also appreciate all of the musical groups who have shared their talents with us, as well as their leaders: Carrie Stadtmueller, Crystal Kerr, Sheri McKelfresh, Marlys Oetken. Finally, we extend our gratitude to Bev Watson as she has continued to lead Our Saviour's Lutheran Preschool.

I am very excited to see what 2023 will bring Our Saviour's Lutheran Church as our leaders, staff, and congregation members continue to give their love and time to this wonderful church.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022

- Communication continues to be very strong among music staff. Our music staff works very well together, planning together and supporting each other in their mission to the church.
- Our Pastoral and Music Staff continue to improve monthly/seasonal "Worship Planning" sheets and grids – enhancing communication and organization amongst all worship participants. The addition of Gus Brockmann to our team has helped with the long range planning and organizational processes.
- Each of the musical groups is continuing to bounce back from the Covid "break". All groups are increasing in numbers, welcoming old and new members.
- During our Holy Week and Easter services, we were proud to include almost all of our musical groups during worship. Our Celebration Band led worship on Palm Sunday; Handbells lead our Maundy Thursday service; Chancel Choir, special musicians and members from Windstrings provided music for our Good Friday Tenebrae Service; multiple music groups helped to lead our celebratory Easter morning services.
- The Chancel Choir once again performed a Christmas Cantata during all 3 worship services during Advent.
- Members of the Kids' Club Choirs performed a special Christmas Program on December 11 during the 10:30 service incorporating Christmas Story Characters with the help of a variety of congregation members.

COLUMBARIUM & MEMORY

ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022

- The greatest part of our ministry is working with families to help facilitate interments of loved ones. It is our great honor to do so. This year Dorothy Lauer, Patricia Dow, Duane Daire, and Mary Lou Sorenson were interred in the columbarium, and Sally Withers was interred in the common crypt. Our prayers continue to be with them and with their families.
- As a committee, we are always working to clarify our process and streamline communication between us, families, and the office. To that end, we worked with Karyn and the Pastors to add information about the columbarium in the funeral planning packet. We also updated our Rules and Regulations which helped us reconnect to our ministry, the heart of which is reflected in our mission statement.
- On a nuts and bolts level, we had some hardware issues—little screws which tend to break—but luckily, with the help of Joel Lamb and Roger Sherman, we were able to figure out how to solve this problem. In the garden, we took out the overgrown butterfly bushes which opened up the space, and we had several work days. Thanks to the Confirmation Class for their hard work! We are thankful to everyone who spends time in the garden, and pitches in to keep it nice.

GOALS FOR 2023

Maintenance of the garden is always a high priority, and as we think about 2023, our biggest goal is to work with Roger Sherman on ideas for a Columbarium expansion. We will be presenting those ideas to Council, and laying out a timeline at that time.

FAITH & JUSTICE TEAM

ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022

- Creation Care Adult Forums with Emphasis on Water were presented for four Sundays from 1-23-22 to 2-13-22 and concluded with special guest, engineer and Deaconess Katrina Martich from Fort Worth, TX, who led us in "The Divine Gift of Water, Sustainable Water Use, and the Spiritual Discipline of Creation Care" As a result of this series, the team requested that the Council appoint a task force to complete a church water audit and prepare a plan for water conservation for environmental justice reasons and also long-term cost savings.
- Gun Violence Prevention Advocacy: Following the murder of 19 students and 2 teachers in Uvalde, TX on 5-24-22, petitions were signed and delivered the following week urging our representatives in Congress to work across the aisle to prevent deaths from gun violence. We helped to secure passage of the first bipartisan federal gun safety legislation in almost three decades!
- Advocacy for Afghans: In the Spring & Summer of 2022, we worked with our Resettlement
 Team to sponsor two petition drives concerning issues that affected our Hamidzai family:
 Releasing Funds Held by the U.S. in order to Help Starving Afghans and passing the Afghan
 Adjustment Act to allow our family and other Afghan allies to expedite adjustment of their
 immigration status and obtain permanent asylum in our country. We also met with Sen.
 Hickenlooper staffers on Zoom and with Rep. Neguse and staff at a Town Hall at CSU in
 August.
- Rally for Justice was held on September 25th in the church parking lot and featured congregational groups and community partners that work on justice issues. Family activities and a taco truck were also provided.
- Music Reparations Task Force was formed to explore how OSLC might educate and take
 action concerning the hymns and choral music from African American slaves and/or by
 composers of color who were most often unnamed and uncompensated. The first
 introduction to the congregation was on Reformation weekend in October, when music from
 "This Far By Faith An African American Resource for Worship" was used.
- Community Advocacy Partnerships: We continued to develop deeper partnerships with ISAAC and Together Colorado. In July, Council approved OSLC becoming an official supporting member of Together Colorado, committing to work with other Colorado faith communities on legislative policy.
- Two Advocacy Workshops were led by John Bisbee in May and November.
- Faith & Justice Book Club continued to meet on the third Monday at 7 p.m. every other month. Titles included non-fiction like "The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We Can Prosper Together" by Heather McGhee and fiction like Toni Morrison's "Beloved"

GOALS FOR 2023

Continue to offer a variety of educational opportunities for OSLC to learn more about justice issues where our faith calls us to act, and then work with community partners to advocate for just policies locally and in our state and nation.

The Church Becoming

When we introduced Church Becoming in late 2019 in anticipation of our 2020 Synod Assembly, we had absolutely no idea how fitting this theme would be. Church Becoming was intended as an invitation for all of us to step together into a space of renewal and transformation - to more fully become the church the Spirit is calling us to be for the life of the world. Three short months into 2020 our journey of becoming moved into turbo speed! Overnight we became a church meeting primarily online for worship; we became a church who gathered via ZOOM over hundreds of hours to brainstorm, lament, share resources, pray, plan, support, and be together.

Having witnessed the violence against George Floyd and other siblings of color, we became a church who engaged the collective work of anti-racism and dismantling white supremacy with greater energy and intention. In the midst of economic hardship, we became a church whose buildings suddenly served as food distribution centers, a church whose people mobilized to ensure for the basic needs of those most vulnerable during the pandemic.

There is no doubt we are a different church than we were last year. We aren't the same people of faith we used to be. And while it's not vet clear how this current chapter will finally shape our becoming, we know that the way forward does not lie behind us. As we move into the Spirit's promised future, we claim our continued call to proclaim God's unconditional, cross-shaped love for the sake of world.

We proclaim and embody God's love through our weekly worship and learning, through digital ordinations and installations, through the work of our Synod Council and our Candidacy Committee, through advocacy and outdoor ministries, through empowering leaders and growing in generosity, through our engagement on the border and our care of neighbors. We proclaim and embody God's unconditional, cross-shaped love as Church Together, through the people, congregations, and ministries of our Rocky Mountain Synod.




Through your gifts

The Rocky Mountain budget is funded by Mission Support, the portion of congregational offering shared to support our collective ministry. 47.5% of the mission support we receive is shared with our Churchwide Organization. Some of those monies return to our synodical ministries through grants and shared staff. The remainder helps us proclaim and embody's God's unconditional love through ministries across the country and around the globe.



Income

91% of the Rocky Mountain Synod Mission is funded through Congregational Mission Support and individual gifts. The remaining 9% comes from Churchwide partnership and investment income.
